Jeudi, la Conférence en médecine familiale CMFC/Banque Scotia 2012 sera prononcée par la très honorable Michaëlle Jean, ancienne gouverneure générale du Canada, qui traitera des défis que représente la prestation de soins aux populations vulnérables. Nous soulignerons également les réalisations de dix-sept étudiants en médecine exceptionnels de partout au Canada, qui recevront chacun une bourse d'études en médecine de 10 000 \$ de la part du CMFC. 

“Transformational Interventions: Treating the Social Determinants of Health in Canada”

« *Interventions transformationnelles : Soigner les déterminants sociaux de la santé au Canada* »

The Rt. Hon. Michaëlle Jean was born in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. After fleeing the brutal regime of Dictator François “Papa Doc” Duvalier, she arrived in Canada with her family as a refugee in 1968. Excelling in school, she pursued undergraduate and graduate studies in Italian and Hispanic languages, literature, and comparative literature at the University of Montréal, Quebec, where she taught at the Faculty of Italian Studies.

During her studies, M^{me} Jean worked for 10 years with shelters for battered women, helping to establish a network of emergency shelters across Quebec and elsewhere in Canada. She later became an award-winning journalist and anchor of news programs at Radio-Canada and CBC.

Mme Jean also took part in several documentary films produced by her husband, filmmaker Jean-Daniel Lafond.

In 2005, M^{me} Jean became Canada’s 27th Governor General and Commander-in-Chief. Throughout her mandate, she promoted dialogue and community engagement among citizens, with particular emphasis on empowering youth. A fervent practitioner of cultural diplomacy, she led 40 missions and State visits in Afghanistan; China; and across Africa, the Americas, and Europe. She is fluent in five languages—French, English, Italian, Spanish, and Creole—and fluently reads Portuguese.

Mme Jean is now Co-President of the Michaëlle Jean Foundation, UNESCO Special Envoy for Haiti, and Chancellor of the University of Ottawa, Ontario.

La très honorable Michaëlle Jean est née à Port-au-Prince, en Haïti. En 1968, fuyant le régime brutal du dictateur François « Papa Doc » Duvalier, elle arrive comme réfugiée au Canada, avec sa famille. Elle réussit très bien à l’école et poursuit des études de premier et deuxième cycles en études littéraires des langues italiennes et hispaniques ainsi qu’en littérature comparée à l’Université de Montréal, où elle enseignera au Département d’études italiennes.

Parallèlement à ses études, Michaëlle Jean a œuvré pendant dix ans auprès des maisons d’hébergement pour femmes victimes de violence conjugale et participé à la mise sur pied d’un réseau d’urgence au Québec et ailleurs au Canada. M^{me} Jean a ensuite connu une brillante carrière de journaliste et de présentatrice d’émissions d’information à Radio-Canada et à la CBC. Elle a également participé à plusieurs films documentaires signés par son mari, le cinéaste Jean-Daniel Lafond.

En 2005, M^{me} Jean est devenue la 27^e gouverneure générale et commandante en chef du Canada. M^{me} Jean a axé son mandat sur la promotion du dialogue et de l’engagement citoyen dans la collectivité, aidant plus particulièrement les jeunes à prendre leur place. Adepte convaincue de la « diplomatie culturelle », elle a mené une quarantaine de missions officielles et de visites d’État, notamment en Afghanistan, en Chine, dans divers pays d’Afrique, des Amériques et de l’Europe. Michaëlle Jean parle couramment cinq langues : le français, l’anglais, l’italien, l’espagnol et le créole, en plus de lire couramment le portugais.

Mme Jean cumule actuellement les fonctions de coprésidente de la Fondation Michaëlle Jean, d’Envoyée spéciale de l’UNESCO en Haïti, et de chancelière de l’Université d’Ottawa.

“Baffled, Befuddled and Bemused: How not to get fooled again, and again, and,...”
« Déconcertés, déroutés, stupéfiés : comment ne pas se faire avoir, encore et encore... »

Dr G. (Mike) Michael Allan is an Associate Professor in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Alberta and the Director of Evidence-Based Medicine. He has been in practice approximately 15 years and presently works at the Northeast Community Health Centre in Edmonton. Mike is the director of the Alberta College of Family Physicians Evidence and CPD Program, including the provincial CME Roadshows.

Dr Allan's keynote deals with the conflicting and confusing nature of medical information. During this keynote presentation, he will review some of the reasons why medical information seems inconsistent and at times, contradictory. He will also examine some of the myths and misinformation around chronic diseases and common medical problems, and reflect on some of the mistakes we've made and some we may still be making. While discussing some of the ways we get fooled trying to "interpret the truth" there will also be some practical information that can be applied immediately to improving patient care.

Dr G. (Mike) Michael Allan est professeur agrégé au département de médecine familiale à l'Université de l'Alberta et directeur de la médecine fondée sur les données probantes. Il exerce la médecine depuis environ 15 ans, actuellement auprès du Northeast Community Health Centre à Edmonton. Dr Allan dirige le Programme sur la médecine fondée sur les données probantes et le DPC du Collège des médecins de famille de l'Alberta, qui comprend les tournées provinciales de FMC.

Dans son allocution, Dr Allan parlera de la confusion qui entoure l'information médicale. Il présentera certains motifs qui expliquent pourquoi l'information médicale semble incohérente, voire même contradictoire. Il examinera certains mythes et renseignements erronés qui entourent les maladies chroniques et problèmes médicaux courants ainsi que certaines erreurs que nous avons commises et que nous continuons de commettre. Dans le courant de ses discussions sur les façons dont nous trébuchons en tentant de « découvrir la vérité », il communiquera des renseignements pratiques qui pourront être appliqués immédiatement pour améliorer la prestation des soins.
