Dr. Brian Chang Toronto Ontario

"I love family medicine because it gives me the unique opportunity to work with underserved and vulnerable population in both in-patient and outpatient settings. I find it rewarding to combine in-patient and outpatient practice experiences and help marginalized patients navigate a complex health care system."

Fostered by a love of family medicine, Dr. Brian Chang obtained his medical degree from the University of Alberta in 2017 and completed his residency at the University of Toronto in 2020.

Upon completing residency, Dr. Chang began working as a hospitalist with the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH) to provide care to in-patients with severe mental illness, while also working with outpatient addiction clinics providing care to patients suffering from substance use disorders. He has been a clinical lecturer at the University of Toronto since November 2021.

Dr. Chang co-leads a quality improvement project seeking to improve colorectal cancer screening in long-stay in-patients at CAMH in the hopes of improving preventive health in in-patients with severe mental illness. This project—in collaboration with University Health Network, Sunnybrook Academic Family Health Team, and CAMH Physician-in-Chief Dr. Vicky Stergiopoulos—received a Canadian Institutes of Health Research grant to support the scaling of cancer screening across mental health organizations in Canada.

Over the course of the COVID-19 pandemic, Dr. Chang has worked extensively in vaccine clinics. In December 2021, he was nominated for a national Pandemic Heroes Award for his work with severely trypanophobic (fear of needles) patients with whom he uses a combination of motivational interviewing, cognitive behavioural therapy, and exposure therapy.

With an early appetite for success in medicine, Dr. Rita Hafizi started her medical education in 2011 after obtaining her bachelor's degree in health sciences, with honours, from the University of Ottawa, where she then began her doctorate of medicine.

After completing her medical doctorate in 2015 Dr. Hafizi was elected Chief Resident at the Bruyère Academic Family Health Team at the University of Ottawa. She has acquired a wealth of experience in family medicine, enabling her to successfully practise as an academic family physician.

As an active member of the teaching faculty at the Department of Family Medicine, Dr. Hafizi mentors both undergraduate and postgraduate medical students and residents.

In 2021 she was awarded the Undergraduate Educator of the Year for her outstanding preceptorship and valuable contributions to medical education.

Whether she is mentoring her peers or fulfilling her role of clerkship rotation director for family medicine, Dr. Hafizi's dedication to family medicine education is unwavering.

"Family medicine paired with teaching and advocacy is the most rewarding career I can imagine. Developing and holding relationships with our patients and seeing the tangible benefits of our interventions day-to-day is a privilege I hold dear."

Dr. Samantha Green has a passion for sustainable and planetary health. She received her medical degree from the University of Ottawa and trained in family medicine at McMaster University. In 2014 she started working with the St. Michael's Hospital Academic Family Health Team (AFHT) and at Inner City Health Associates. Her clinical work focuses on care of marginalized populations, including people experiencing homelessness and newcomers.

An assistant professor and faculty lead in Climate Change and Health at the University of Toronto (U of T)'s Department of Family & Community Medicine, Dr. Green works to integrate planetary health into undergraduate and postgraduate medical education. She does this both at the U of T and across Canada through initiatives at the Association of Faculties of Medicine of Canada and Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada.

She has also collaborated with the Centre for Sustainable Health Systems and CASCADES on a local sustainable inhaler project, a project now being applied nationally. Additionally, she has collaborated with teachers and researchers from across U of T on planetary health research and knowledge translation.

As a key member of the St. Michael's AFHT Green Team Dr. Green is directly involved in planetary health advocacy in her clinic. She is also active, both provincially and nationally, as a member of the Ontario regional committee of the Canadian Association of Physicians for the Environment and co-founder of Doctors for Safe Cycling.

Mimi Divinsky Award for History and Narrative in Family Medicine

From a young age, Dr. Rory O'Sullivan possessed a strong interest in journalism and creative writing. Prior to completing the Foundation Year Program in literature and philosophy at the University of King's College, Dr. O'Sullivan worked as a reporter for the Irish Medical Times.

Following the call to pursue a career in medicine, Dr. O'Sullivan began his journey at Queen's University, obtaining his medical doctorate in 2010. Over the next few years, he completed a family medicine residency at McMaster University and an emergency medicine residency at McGill University.

Throughout his career Dr. O'Sullivan has worked in various clinical settings, including rural emergency rooms and hospital inpatient units.

Having a deep-rooted passion for Indigenous health and the care of vulnerable groups, Dr. O'Sullivan also received the opportunity to serve as the community physician for the Poplar Hill First Nation in northwestern Ontario for two years.

Since 2017 he has excelled as a staff physician at the Toronto Western Family Health Team, and as a clinical lecturer at the University of Toronto's Temerty Faculty of Medicine.

From his narrative accomplishments to caring for various families and their health, Dr. O'Sullivan is an integral part the Canadian medical community.

Dr. Maxine Dumas Pilon Montreal, Quebec

After completing her family medicine residency in 2005, Dr. Maxine Dumas Pilon completed an enhanced skills program in maternal and child health at McGill University. She practised and taught at St. Mary's Hospital for 15 years before co-founding Clinique Indigo, where she currently practises. She has also been an associate professor in the Department of Family Medicine at McGill University since 2014.

In addition to her teaching duties, Dr. Dumas Pilon has conducted many studies on perinatology, access to care, and innovation with different branches of the Quebec Ministry of Health and Social Services (MSSS), the Canadian Foundation for Healthcare Improvement (CFHI), and the Quebec College of Family Physicians (QCFP), of which she was president from 2014 to 2017.

Dr. Dumas Pilon also initiated the eConsult project in Quebec. This led her to her current position as medical advisor for the MSSS, where she is responsible for files relating to access and digitization. She has long taken part in numerous research projects.

Since 2016 she has been chair of the Scientific Committee of the QCFP Symposium on Innovation. This event, which was inspired by the TV show "Dragons' Den," brings together clinical leaders, innovators, and key stakeholders to promote the diffusion of made-in-Quebec innovations in family medicine on a larger scale.

Dr. Dumas Pilon received the Royal College Award for Early-Career Leadership in 2011 and the CFPC's Nadine St-Pierre Award in 2003.

She has a keen interest in bioethics, her first field of study, and particularly in issues surrounding the allocation of resources and the relationship between medicine and death. She believes that family medicine has a positive impact on the health of individuals and communities. Being able to accompany so many individuals on their journey through life is a great privilege for her. Dr. Dumas Pilon and her husband are also the proud parents of three children whom they adore.

Jean-Pierre Despins Award

The award is named in memory of Dr. Jean-Pierre Despins, a former CFPC president (1995–1996) and chair of the FAFM Board (1999–2000). It honours a CFPC family physician member identified as an outstanding advocate and public spokesperson for family medicine, family physicians, and patients.

Dr. Stuart Iglesias Parry Sound, Ontario

"The historical definition of primary care, where procedural care is owned exclusively by the specialties, has negatively impacted rural Canada, where there are few specialists. Without local surgery programs, rural emergency, trauma, and maternity services, are not sustainable."

A rural family physician working to bring evidence and advocacy to the paradigm that rural primary care requires family physicians be trained and supported with anesthesia, surgery, and operative delivery skills. This best described Dr. Iglesias' role as a champion in family medicine.

Dr. Iglesias received his medical degree in 1979 at the University of Toronto. He then undertook a rotating internship at the Toronto East General Hospital, followed by six months of anesthesia and surgery training. He spent the next 38 years working as a full practice authority and emergency surgical skills rural family physician in Hinton, Alberta, and both Gibsons and Bella Bella in British Columbia. He was also a driver in elevating the Enhanced and Obstetrical Surgical Skills training programs to Category 1 with a Certificate of Added Competence.

Dr. Iglesias has published over 30 peer reviewed papers. Some of his pieces include: the Joint Position Papers – Rural Maternity Care (1998); Training Family Physician's in Cesarean Section (1999); Anesthesia (2000); Rural Surgery and Operative Delivery (2015); and Consensus Statement on Networks for High Quality Care in Rural Anesthesia, Surgery, and Obstetrics (2021).

Donald I. Rice Award

The Donald I. Rice Award is named in memory of Dr. Donald I. Rice, Executive Director of the CFPC from 1965 to 1985. This award recognizes an outstanding CFPC family physician member for their contributions to teaching and leadership in the discipline of family medicine.

Dr. Kannin Osei-Tutu Calgary, Alberta

"Family medicine affords me the privilege of impacting patients in a meaningful way through empowerment with tools and strategies to enable them to be the healthiest and best versions of themselves."

A leader in equity, diversity, inclusion, and wellness at the local, provincial, and national levels, Dr. Kannin Osei-Tutu serves as a family physician in Calgary, Alberta. Dr. Osei-Tutu works in acute care inpatient medicine caring for patients with diseases related to sociopolitical inequity and marginalization.

In addition to his role as a family physician, Dr. Osei-Tutu serves as the founder and President of the Black Physicians' Association of Alberta (BPAA), an executive member of the Black Physicians of Canada, and the national Chair of the Royal College Accreditation Working Group to Address Anti-Black Racism in postgraduate medical education.

Finally, Dr. Osei-Tutu's emerging research program seeks to reconceptualize compassion in an inclusive way while developing digital technology and artificial intelligence tools to promote equity in health outcomes.



2022 Canada's Family Physicians of the Year

Reg L. Perkin Awards

The FAFM gratefully acknowledges the generous contributions of Scotiabank and MD Financial Management in support of Canada's Family Physicians of the Year.

Since 1972 the CFPC has honoured family doctor members who exemplify excellence in the guiding principles of family medicine. In 1996 the award became known as the Reg L. Perkin Awards in honour of Dr. Perkin, who was the CFPC's executive director from 1985 to 1996.

The awards are presented to 11 outstanding family physicians—one from each province and one for the territories—during the annual Family Medicine Forum. Canada's Family Physicians of the Year are nominated by their health care colleagues, community leaders, and provincial Chapters of the CFPC for providing exceptional care to their patients, making meaningful contributions to the health and well-being of their communities, and dedicating themselves as researchers and as educators of future generations of family doctors.





Dr. Karin Kausky Whistler, British-Columbia

The medical lead for the Canadian National Ski & Snowboard Cross Team, Dr. Karin Kausky has worked as a full-service family physician in Whistler, British Columbia, since 1993. Dr. Kausky's responsibilities to her patients extend beyond "cradle to grave," and reach out to other members of her patients' families.

By helping found Whistler 360 Healthcare Collaborative Society (Whistler 360), a local non-profit, Dr. Kausky is reimagining primary care and how it is delivered and supported in her community. From her advocacy initiatives linking her Whistler community with greater health services in Vancouver, to her work as a board member of Sea To Sky, where she represented the family physicians. Her dedication and commitment to full service longitudinal care in her community is remarkable.

In 2021 Dr. Kausky became a founding director of Whistler 360 Health Collaborative Society. In her role with Whistler 360, she has been a key aspect of aligning community groups with the vision of a primary care centre. Dr. Kausky also delivered an extraordinary TEDx talk last year elucidating the power of social prescription and demonstrating how It takes a village to manage COVID-19.

Whistler is fortunate to have an exemplary family physician like Dr. Karin Kausky in its community.





Dr. Marjan Abbasi **Edmonton**, Alberta

Dr. Marjan Abbasi obtained her medical degree from Tehran University in Iran. After moving to Canada, she completed the Family Medicine Residency Program and received the Care of Elderly Diploma at the University of Alberta in 2006.

Dr. Abbasi holds a Certificate of Added Competency in the Care of the Elderly and is currently the site lead for the geriatric program at the Misericordia Community Hospital in Edmonton. She also teaches as an associate clinical professor in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Alberta.

Throughout her career in medicine, Dr. Abbasi has focused on the care of seniors with frailty in various settings. Over the years she has acquired a greater understanding of the needs of vulnerable patients with frailty. This has aided her in creating and implementing several programs to respond to the unmet needs of this population, including the Geriatric Evaluation and Management (GEM) program. In 2014 she received the Physician Innovator of the Year Award from the Edmonton Zone Medical Association for her work with the program.

Dr. Abbasi is the co-founder of the Senior Community Hub (SCH) program, an integrated primary care model that supports family physicians in identifying, assessing, and managing older adults living with frailty in the community. The SCH builds on the principles of the patient-centred medical home to transform primary care into a central hub. This allows for better management of the emotional health and social care needs of complex older adults and their caregivers. In 2018 the SCH was awarded the Top Frailty Innovation of the Year by the Canadian Frailty Network.

Dr. Marjan Abbasi continues to enjoy building long-term trusted relationships with her patients, their circle of support, and the care team to improve their quality of life and wellness.





Dr. Razawa Maroof Regina, Saskatchewan

From an early age, Dr. Razawa Maroof dreamed of becoming a doctor. This dream came true in 1986, when she received her medical degree from the University of Salaheddin. She then went on to pursue a residency in obstetrics and gynecology, obtaining her diploma from the University of Baghdad in 1995.

Due to ongoing turmoil in her birth country, she immigrated to Canada as a refugee. In 2002 Dr. Maroof was awarded Certification in the College of Family Physicians of Canada (CCFP) and then awarded Fellowship in the College of Family Physicians (FCFP) in 2013.

As a single parent adapting to a new culture and lifestyle, life was initially difficult for Dr. Maroof. But in time, she was able to build a group of friends and colleagues and started her practice at the Regina Community Clinic. She currently works at the same clinic alongside a team of talented and kind-hearted physicians, staff, and nurses.

Starting in 2019 Dr. Maroof began also practising at the Chronic Pain Clinic, treating patients who deal with chronic pain and opioid use disorder. During this time she acquired training and certification to use neuromodulators. This allows her to treat migraine headaches and temporomandibular joint (TMJ) dysfunction. Given her triumphs and experiences a considerable number of Dr. Maroof's patients consist of immigrants, women, and refugees.

At the Regina Community Clinic Dr. Maroof is the physician lead for the Refugee Health Committee. She frequently gives refugee health lectures to family medicine and psychiatry residents. As a volunteer mentor, she participated every Saturday between 2010 and 2013 in the SEARCH program for medical, pharmacy, and social work students to help better the lives of the people in her community.

Dr. Maroof was the clinical assistant professor at the University of Saskatchewan, between 2006 and 2013, and was appointed associate professor in 2015. She primarily teaches clinical skills, advanced communication skills, and general medicine.

Kindness, professionalism, mentorship, and family are the cornerstones that make up Dr. Razawa Maroof—her dedication to these four ideals is what drives her.





Dr. Myron Thiessen Steinbach, Manitoba

A caring soul with an innate drive to support patients through the difficult times of their lives, Dr. Myron Thiessen is a central figure in Manitoba's health care landscape. Shortly after obtaining his medical doctorate from the University of Manitoba Faculty of Medicine, Dr. Thiessen joined the Steinbach Family Medical Clinic where he practised until 2008. At this point he was presented with the opportunity to join his local regional health authority as the vice-president of medical services. Motivated by the opportunity to improve health outcomes for his community Dr. Thiessen accepted the role.

As vice-president Dr. Thiessen led the restructuring of the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority's primary care program and the development of a medical leadership structure in the region, including the creation of a family medicine lead—the first of its kind in the province. All of this was accomplished while also enhancing collaboration between physicians within the region to promote physician well-being. During this time, he also served on several missions to locations including Peru, Haiti, Rwanda, and El Salvador.

During his tenure at the Interlake-Eastern Regional Health Authority, Dr. Thiessen achieved his Canadian Certified Physician Executive designation, one of only a handful of physicians in Manitoba who have achieved this Canadian Medical Association designation.

After 12 years serving his regional health authority and supporting various international missions, Dr. Thiessen has retired from his position and now works as a primary care physician in Vita, Manitoba.





Dr. Anjali Oberai Wawa, Ontario

Dr. Anjali Oberai received her undergraduate medical degree from the University of Ottawa in 1993 and shortly after completed her family medicine residency at the University of Calgary.

In 1998 in Wawa, Ontario, Dr. Anjali Oberai began practice as a rural generalist with a keen interest in exercise stress testing and antimicrobial stewardship in a rural setting. Before 1998 Dr. Oberai was a locum physician in rural Albert, Ontario, and what is now Nunavut. Through her interest in antimicrobial stewardship, she has taken on the co-chair role at Public Health Ontario (PHO)'s Antibiotic Stewardship Advisory Committee. This promotes antimicrobial stewardship as an effective strategy for reducing inappropriate and excessive antimicrobial use while improving and optimizing antimicrobial therapy and patient clinical outcomes.

During the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) University's recent Northern Constellations conference, Dr. Oberai was honoured with the Community Champion Award. This accolade highlighted her active involvement in NOSM University teaching undergraduate and postgraduate learners and her contributions as co-section chair for family medicine.

Dr. Oberai had many inspiring mentors and colleagues along the way, particularly when she first moved to Wawa, who encouraged and supported her in practising full-scope medicine. Dr. Oberai and her husband raised two incredible children in Wawa, and she is grateful to call Wawa her home. Her service to her community spans over 25 years, and for this great milestone she was honoured with the Society of Rural Physicians' Long Service Award. Outside work, Dr. Oberai loves exploring the outdoors and enjoying the best of rural life.





Dr. Gilles Brousseau Gatineau, Quebec

After receiving his medical degree from the University of Montreal in 1982, Dr. Gilles Brousseau completed his postgraduate training at the Centre hospitalier de Verdun (Verdun Hospital) before settling in Gatineau, where he has been practising family medicine since 1983.

Until September 2016 he was part of the medical team at the Saint-Alexandre Family Medicine Group and also worked in the emergency room and with hospital patients. Dr. Brousseau is particularly interested in computerization and was involved in studying and developing electronic medical records, serving on several expert committees.

Dr. Brousseau was appointed assistant professor at McGill University in 1990 and has been heavily involved in the clinical teaching of medical students and family medicine residents for many years. In his role as assistant dean of medical education for the Outaouais Region, Dr. Brousseau led the McGill University Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences' Campus Outaouais project, where programs are offered entirely in French. He also oversaw the development of the integrated clerkship program in Gatineau, which has been highly successful since its launch in 2010. Under his leadership, the Gatineau family medicine unit underwent significant expansion from 1990 to 2007 and is now one of McGill University's most active affiliated teaching sites outside of Montreal. In 2014 Dr. Brousseau was awarded the MSW Excellence in the Learning Environment Award, an honour bestowed by his students at McGill.

Dr. Brousseau believes that family medicine is a specialty that ensures that patients of all ages receive comprehensive care by leveraging a vast array of knowledge, skills, and competencies in many fields. He views empathy, the ability to listen, the provision of support, decision support, and clinical pertinence as values that characterize a good family physician.





Dr. Chantal Arsenault Dieppe, New Brunswick

Originally from Dieppe, Dr. Chantal Arseneault completed her family medicine residency at Laval University in 1990. Through the years, she has been in private practice and has also practised in the emergency department and as a hospitalist at the Dr. Georges-L.-Dumont University Hospital Centre (DGLDUHC).

She was a clinical professor of psychiatry at the University of Sherbrooke's Centre de formation médicale du Nouveau-Brunswick (New Brunswick Centre for Medical Education) and even acted in an educational film depicting personality disorders. In addition, she lectured on osteoporosis and mental health, was a health commentator for "Les Éclaireurs" on CBC/Radio-Canada, hosted meetings with authors at Moncton's Frye Festival (the largest literary event in Atlantic Canada), and chaired the DGLDUHC physicians' Public Relations Committee. She also founded and directed the DGLDUHC physicians' choir.

Dr. Arseneault is passionate about music and was the singer-songwriter of the art-jazz-pop album "Une virgule," which she recorded in 2014. Now at the beginning of her last years in private practice, Dr. Arsenault continues to cultivate a passion for the therapeutic relationship with her patients. In addition, she avoids drowning in the bureaucracy that was made all the more apparent by the pandemic by "choosing wisely" to practise resilience, creativity, and gratitude.





Dr. Amer Ahmad Windsor, Nova Scotia

Whether it was his mother or relatives on his father's side, Dr. Amer Ahmad's family was never short on thriving doctors. He especially admired his mother's ability to dedicate time to her family while having a successful medical career. Influenced by his dedicated family, Dr. Ahmad went on to study medicine, completing his doctorate at Dalhousie University in 1989.

Over the past 30 years, Dr. Ahmad's career has consisted of both clinical and emergency medicine experiences. He provides comprehensive medical care to all ages, from newborns to seniors, and has been an advocate for his patients and community.

Demonstrating a commitment to improving our emergency services in times of crisis, Dr. Ahmad has worked to minimize disruptions caused by the shortage of medical staff across the country. With the current deficits in primary care, emergency rooms are severely overwhelmed. Dr. Ronald Nicholson Summerside, Prince Edward Island

Dr. Ronald Nicholson has been practising family medicine for 46 years, beginning his career at Summerside Medical Centre and the Prince County Hospital in 1976. He has worked at a family practice that specializes in low-risk obstetrical care, surgical assistance, emergency room coverage, and mental health and addiction. Dr. Nicholson has also taught as an assistant professor in the Department of Family Medicine at Dalhousie University.

Possessing a deep-rooted understanding of individual life situations and a desire to help people through family medicine, Dr. Nicholson trusted that family medicine would provide him with opportunities to assist people in various stages of their lives and to build meaningful connections.

Dr. Nicholson remains committed to family medicine through his passion for supporting his patients throughout their lives. He believes family medicine offers the opportunity to build connections and it gives him a deeper understanding of his patients' unique life experiences.

In 2014 he received the Dr. Thomas Moore Award for displaying dedication and achievement throughout his medical career. The award highlights his professionalism, expertise, and commitment to family medicine practice in Prince Edward Island.





Dr. Jared Butler Grand Falls-Windsor, Newfoundland and Labrador

Dr. Jared Butler has always regarded family medicine as the heart of health care in Canada. Being raised with values that instilled the importance of giving back to others, he envisioned a life in family medicine that would provide him with opportunities to care for patients in his community. In 2008 he obtained a degree in medicine from Trinity College Dublin, then completed his family medicine residency program at Memorial University of Newfoundland, graduating in 2010.

Throughout his career, Dr. Butler has aimed to divide his professional time between his sports and family medicine practices and his responsibilities as a physician. He has worked as the medical liaison for Ball Hockey Canada and Basketball Newfoundland & Labrador, the Grand Falls-Windsor Minor Hockey's medical director, and as vice president and chief medical officer for Hockey NL.

In 2017 Dr. Butler received the Award of Excellence from the Newfoundland and Labrador College of Family Physicians. He chairs the palliative care committee that developed standing orders and policies around palliative care, and cherishes the award highlighting his work in this area. His most recent undertaking is the launch of the Holdfast Foundation in memory of his late parents and brother. This foundation endeavours to improve and inspire the lives of children in the community.

Acknowledging the community for shaping him into the doctor he is today, Dr. Jared Butler leads his professional practices to give back to his peers and his community by providing high-quality, high-impact care.





Dr. David Pontin Yellowknife, Northwest Territories

From a young age, Dr. David Pontin loved family medicine for its capacity to reach beyond his community. This made him want to practise medicine in rural areas to help those in need. He completed his medical training at the University of British Columbia and residency training at Dalhousie University. In 2005 Dr. Pontin worked as a rural emergency doctor in eastern Canada for a year and then returned to British Columbia for more training.

Dr. Pontin spent the first 12 years of his career in Yellowknife as a family doctor practising emergency care and later transitioned to practising full-time family care. He now teaches as an assistant professor at the University of Alberta and is the site director of the university's Yellowknife Residency Training Site.

In July 2020 Yellowknife became a full-time learning site. Dr. Pontin actively endorsed this initiative, which was almost 10 years in the making. He also led a residency program in Yellowknife to address challenges the territory faces to recruiting and retaining family physicians and other specialists. The program involved a partnership between Northwest Territories health and social services authorities and the University of Alberta Department of Family Medicine.

This year, with support from PracticeNWT and in partnership with PEER (Patients, Experience, Evidence, Research), Dr. Pontin co-founded the PEER North Conference. The conference aimed to provide a culturally relevant northern educational forum to connect and strengthen relationships among northern health care providers around current, evidence-based, primary care topics of interest.

Dr. David Pontin continues to drive efforts toward providing high-quality health care to northern Canada and bringing evidence-based care to all northern patients.
