Awards Gala

The Awards Gala, held during Family Medicine Forum, is an exciting evening as we gather to celebrate the 2023 family medicine awards and those who advance the practice of family medicine.

Being a family doctor is hard and it isn't for everyone. Family doctors have unique abilities, strong relationship building skills, and a penchant for curiosity. Family doctors are the heart of the health care system and leaders in primary care, yet we also know that investments in family medicine have fallen short and that many family doctors are struggling. But family medicine is worth it. We know this and our patients know it.

The CFPC is calling attention to the crisis in family medicine and working with decision makers to secure the present and safeguard the future through funding and supports for family doctors.

While this promise of funding is a good start, this money must go to where it is needed the most: supporting primary care and family physicians.

While this is no doubt a challenging time in family medicine, it is often during the most challenging times, times of adversity, when we learn the most about ourselves. As Benjamin Disraeli, the United Kingdom's prime minister in the late 1800s, said: "There is no education like adversity". And as the modern poet LL Cool J advised: "When adversity strikes, that's when you have to be the most calm. Take a step back, stay strong, stay grounded, and press on."

This year we gather to celebrate your successes and the family medicine leaders of 2023. This celebration is about you, your contributions, and the leadership you demonstrate. Thank you.

The recognition of your remarkable work would not be possible without the Foundation for Advancing Family Medicine (FAFM)'s unwavering focus on philanthropic efforts. Every dollar the FAFM raises advances family medicine, which includes supporting excellence in education, research, and community-focused care. Dr. Claire Bodkin Hamilton, Ontario

Dr. Claire Bodkin thrives in the diverse world of family medicine, providing comprehensive medical care, describing herself as the Swiss army knife of the profession. Dr. Bodkin's practice in Hamilton, Ontario, delves into the intricacies of medicine, encompassing everything from harm reduction and substance use disorder treatment to primary care for individuals using drugs.

Dr. Bodkin's commitment isn't confined to Hamilton, she also takes on roles as a locum tenens in remote areas of Ontario and the Northwest Territories. Further amplifying her influence, Dr. Bodkin co-directs the Hamilton Social Medicine Response Team, which helps those using drugs and those without housing, all while championing the causes of justice and liberation.

In conjunction with her hands-on medical roles, Dr. Bodkin is an assistant clinical professor at McMaster University's Department of Family Medicine. Through her recent research project "Nowhere to Go" she delved into the health repercussions of service restrictions, enriching her knowledge through community-driven research collaborations.

Dr. Bodkin says she owes immense gratitude to her chosen and biological families, mentors, and communities. These relationships have instilled in her the significance of community-centred care and the collaborative vision for a healthier world. Through all her endeavours, her passion echoes the belief that family physicians are indispensable and adaptive. Dr. Claire Bodkin is an example of dedication in the medical community, shaping a healthier tomorrow.

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Dr. Molly Whalen-Browne Edmonton, Alberta

After completing her residency in family medicine at the University of Calgary in 2018, Dr. Molly Whalen-Browne became a family physician providing primary care services to refugees at the New Canadians Health Centre, as the health centre's founding physician and inaugural medical director. Dr. Whalen-Browne also has a focused reproductive and sexual health practice—at the Birth Control Centre she sees patients who experience barriers to accessing contraceptives and other sexual health care.

Dr. Whalen-Browne spent the first few years of her career practising remote family medicine in the Northwest Territories, particularly in the town of Fort Smith. She continues to provide locum services in the Northwest Territories and loves the community and diversity of practice.

An assistant clinical professor in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Alberta and a clinical lecturer in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Calgary, Dr. Whalen-Browne's interests are varied, from refugee health and Indigenous health to reproductive and sexual health, and medical education. She has been the Program Director for the Health Equity Enhanced Skills program at the University of Calgary since 2022 where she is also the Domain Lead for Health Equity in the family medicine program.

Even in the early stages of her career, Dr. Molly Whalen-Browne demonstrates outstanding potential as a future leader and innovator of health care in Canada.

Dr. Francine Lemire **Corner Brook, Newfoundland and Labrador**

With over 33 years in family medicine, Dr. Francine Lemire has made remarkable contributions to family medicine across Canada and in Corner Brook, Newfoundland and Labrador. A particular highlight of her career in Corner Brook was in leading the organization of medical services for their 1999 Canada Winter Games.

Her tenure at the CFPC stands out as a testament to her dedication and leadership in the field. Holding the position of Executive Director and CEO, Dr. Lemire was key to numerous initiatives, such as bringing family medicine training into the future, modernizing examinations, and enhancing the emphasis on family medicine research. Under her guidance, the CFPC underwent a transformative governance review, streamlining its operations and ensuring its continued relevance in the ever-evolving field of medicine. She also oversaw the creation of the Besrour Centre for Global Family Medicine, enabling the CFPC to contribute to global family medicine education.

Moreover, with her at the helm, the FAFM matured into a significant charity, championing the cause and advancement of family medicine both nationally and internationally.

Dr. Lemire's proficiency in both English and French has been pivotal in her advocacy efforts. She has actively shaped health policies, set standards for family medicine, and collaborated extensively with policy representatives and physician organizations.

In addition to her administrative and advocacy roles, Dr. Lemire has a rich academic background, engaging in both teaching and research. Her unwavering commitment to family medicine has not only elevated the CFPC's stature but has also underscored the critical role family physicians play in Canada.

Jean-Pierre Despins Award

Dr. Guy Béland Montreal, Quebec

Dr. Guy Béland's journey started with his medical training at Laval University, where he received his medical degree in 1979. Since that time, he has been involved in the practice of family medicine for more than four decades. This discipline fits perfectly with his philosophy on life, which is centred on listening, respect, and the understanding of individual needs. After having devoted a significant portion of his career to working in remote areas, including 12 years in Havre-St-Pierre, he practised in Quebec for 28 years. In addition to his commitments with respect to family medicine, Dr. Béland also acquired valuable experience by working in emergency rooms, practising hospital medicine, specializing in geriatric medicine, and providing home care.

Dr. Béland has not only excelled in clinical practice but has also played a key role in medical education. Since the beginning of his career, he has been involved in educating future physicians.

In addition to his clinical and educational achievements, Dr. Béland has also held leadership positions, including as director of the Department of Family and Emergency Medicine at Laval University for eight years. His ability to rally teams around common goals and to advocate for his patients and his specialty have been an invaluable asset in improving health care.

Dr. Béland is a true model of dedication, compassion, and leadership in the medical field, and he inspires generations of health professionals. His impressive career—characterized by his love for people, his unconditional respect for patients, and his commitment to family medicine—reminds us that this discipline is based first and foremost on a noble mission of service to individuals and their families.



2023 Canada's Family Physicians of the Year

Reg L. Perkin Awards

The FAFM gratefully acknowledges the generous contributions of Scotiabank and MD Financial Management in support of Canada's Family Physicians of the Year.

Since 1972 the CFPC has honoured family doctor members who exemplify excellence in the guiding principles of family medicine. In 1996 the award became known as the Reg L. Perkin Awards in honour of Dr. Perkin, who was the CFPC's executive director from 1985 to 1996.

The awards are presented to 11 outstanding family physicians—one from each province and one for the territories—during the annual Family Medicine Forum. Canada's Family Physicians of the Year are nominated by their health care colleagues, community leaders, and provincial Chapters of the CFPC for providing exceptional care to their patients, making meaningful contributions to the health and well-being of their communities, and dedicating themselves as researchers and as educators of future generations of family doctors.



Having always loved a medical challenge, Dr. Jennifer Lush has embarked on a medical career with an optimistic outlook and rigour for exploring endless possibilities. Dr. Lush's roles as a family physician have spanned emergency medicine, maternity care, palliative care, and more. In addition to practising in rural towns and cities along the West Coast, she has worked in Australia as a locum, in obstetrics, and in longitudinal community family practice.

Since 2016 Dr. Lush has lived and practised in Victoria, British Columbia. She is a member of the University of British Columbia's clinical faculty for medical students and its family medicine residency program. Both positions have brought her valuable challenges, insights, and profound satisfaction.

Motivated by concerns about the unstable work environment, Dr. Lush engages in advocacy. She used mainstream and social media to emphasize the vital role of family physicians and the obstacles they encounter. Dr. Lush collaborated with political representatives, official doctor organizations, and the grassroots advocacy group BC Health Care Matters, reinforcing the message "Everyone Deserves a Family Doctor."

Such efforts have established Dr. Jennifer Lush as a pillar in her community and a significant figure in health care.



For nearly two decades, Dr. Tina Korownyk has been at the forefront of family medicine in Edmonton. Her reach extends beyond clinical practice into the academic realm. Dr. Korownyk currently holds the position of professor in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Alberta, where she also serves as Chair. Her commitment to evidence-based care shines through her role as a founding member of Practising Evidence-Based Recommendations (PEER), an initiative championing primary care using the best evidence available.

Beyond her academic roles, Dr. Korownyk is a prolific contributor to the medical community. She actively develops Tools for Practice and PEER guidelines, making evidence accessible to practitioners. A recognized voice in her field, she has spoken at provincial and national conferences and boasts over 125 publications in peer-reviewed journals. Her leadership extends to coordinating the evidence-based medicine program for family medicine residents at the University of Alberta and steering the Pragmatic Trials team, focusing on patient-centric care through pragmatic randomized controlled trials.

In addition to earning such commendable professional accolades, Dr. Korownyk finds joy in her personal life. A devoted wife and mother to four vibrant children, she cherishes her time outdoors, reflecting on the vastness and diversity of family medicine.



As a broad-spectrum generalist, Dr. Sean Groves has dedicated himself to serving challenging and complex patient populations in rural and remote settings. A proud alumnus of the University of Saskatchewan, Dr. Groves embarked on his journey in rural family medicine in 2005. In 2010 he established the La Ronge Rural and Remote Family Medicine Residency training program.

His medical expertise is vast and varied, encompassing areas such as addictions medicine, obstetrics, sports medicine, primary care for HIV and hepatitis C, and more. Beyond the confines of medicine, Dr. Groves showcases his joy of sports, playing hockey and serving as the team physician for the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League's Ice Wolves. His commitment to community service is evident in his roles on the La Ronge and Area Minor Baseball League, coaching the U15 and U18 teams, and his recent induction into the Board of Directors for Men of the North.

La Ronge is Dr. Groves' workplace and home. Together with his wife, Beckie, a high school math teacher, they've raised four remarkable children: Julia, a budding nurse; Solomon, an engineering student; Isabel, pursuing teaching; and Pikaea, exploring arts and science. Dr. Sean Groves stands as a dedication to medicine and the heart of his community.



With a dedication to patient and community care, Dr. Grant Goldberg has consistently demonstrated a commitment to health prevention and promotion, addressing the unique needs of each patient. Dr. Goldberg's journey as a family physician has seen him take on roles from the Mount Carmel Clinic from 1995 to 2011, Corydon Primary Care Clinic from 2011 to 2017, and the ACCESS Fort Garry Primary Care Clinic since 2017.

In addition to the clinics, Dr. Goldberg served as a family physician in Churchill, Manitoba, reaching remote communities such as Baker Lake and Sanikiluag in Nunavut. These diverse experiences have enriched his perspective, allowing a broader understanding of patient needs across different communities. His extensive career highlights his medical expertise and a deep-rooted passion for serving communities and promoting better health outcomes, which has solidified his reputation as a cornerstone in the medical community.

Dr. Goldberg's proactive approach to health care has seen him engage in various community outreach programs, emphasizing the importance of preventive care. His collaborative nature and willingness to share knowledge have been instrumental in shaping the future of health care, making Dr. Goldberg a mentor and guide for future medical professionals.

On a personal note, Dr. Goldberg is happily married to his wife, Marni. Together, they are proud parents to three daughters. Outside of his professional life, Dr. Goldberg is an avid lover of the outdoors. He cherishes moments spent at the lake, indulges in cross-country skiing, and is passionate about cycling.



Growing up in Jamaica and completing medical school training at the University of West Indies, Dr. Danielle Brown-Shreves completed her family medicine residency at the University of Ottawa in 2012.

Dr. Brown-Shreves is the founder and executive medical director of Restore Medical Clinics, Ottawa's first Black-led multidisciplinary clinic. She centres her practice on delivering comprehensive, collaborative, and compassionate care to the community, with a focus on vulnerable populations.

In addition to her clinical work, Dr. Brown-Shreves boasts numerous academic accomplishments. She serves as an assistant professor at Queen's University and has an adjunct position at the University of Ottawa. She is also an avid preceptor and supports many students throughout their training. As a health care leader, Dr. Brown-Shreves participates in various leadership discussions both locally and provincially, advocating for patients and driving health system reforms. She cherishes time with her family, loves to travel and immersing herself in different cultures, and volunteers for several mentorship roles within her community.

Dr. Brown-Shreves offers comprehensive care to vulnerable groups, including refugees, immigrants, and marginalized individuals. With first-hand knowledge of how socio-demographic factors influence health and well-being, she remains committed to enhancing health outcomes for these vulnerable communities.



Dr. Isabelle Gosselin has been practising family medicine in the university family medicine group (GMF-U) de Saint-Hubert on Montreal's South Shore for 24 years. She has also practised hospital medicine in the Department of General Medicine at the Hôpital Pierre-Boucher.

Dr. Gosselin received her medical degree from the University of Sherbrooke in 1996, followed by a specialization in family medicine at the same university in 1998. Over the years, she has served in various roles in the fields of family medicine and medical education. In 2016 Dr. Gosselin became the assistant director of the family and emergency medicine residency program at the University of Montreal. This role has allowed her to make significant contributions to the training of future family physicians and emergency physicians.

During her academic career, Dr. Gosselin was an assistant clinical professor at the University of Sherbrooke and played a key role in providing educational support to medical residents. In 2023 Dr. Gosselin received a Certificate of Merit Award from the Canadian Association of Medical Education in recognition of her dedication to medical training.

In addition to her involvement in teaching, she has held clinical roles, including as a clinical physician specializing in diabetes at the Dr. Georges-L.-Dumont University Hospital Centre, and has sat on several medical committees.

Throughout her career, Dr. Babin has made significant contributions to the literature in various medical fields. She contributed to diabetes research by publishing articles in journals such as the Canadian Journal of Diabetes and Diabetology & Metabolic Syndrome.

Dr. Babin embodies medical and educational excellence and has distinguished herself through her exemplary career in medicine as well as her significant contribution to medical research, which makes her a leading figure in health care in Canada.



With a great interest in family medicine and advanced reproductive technology, Dr. Emmanuel Ajuwon has consistently pushed the boundaries of medical practice and education. Serving as the Director of Lemuela Medical Limited, he brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to the forefront of health care.

Dr. Ajuwon's extensive educational background spans from his Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery from the University of Ilorin in Nigeria to Assisted Reproduction Technology at the University of Nottingham, United Kingdom. 


Hailing from County Louth, Ireland, after earning his general practitioner credentials in 2015, Dr. Padraig Casey moved to Prince Edward Island (PEI) in 2017 with his wife and three children.

Embracing the Island's challenges, he showcased his leadership as president of the Medical Society of PEI, guiding the community through trying times, including COVID-19, Hurricane Fiona, and pivotal health system transitions. The desire to help those around him has resonated with Dr. Jim Bowen since he was five years old, when he believed it was his destiny to become a doctor. After completing medical school in Ottawa, Dr. Bowen explored various medical fields, eventually choosing family medicine because of its comprehensiveness and the high skill required to help solve problems in their undifferentiated state and to address undiagnosed issues.
