Longitudinal Care is Important

- It has been reported that 650 000 Albertans are searching for a Family Physician¹
- Alberta has a deficit of Family Physicians providing clinic-based longitudinal care^{2, 3, 4}
- This deficit will increase as Alberta's population grows and ages^{13,14}
- Longitudinal care has been shown to reduce emergency department visits, hospital admissions, all cause mortality as well as reducing health care costs ^{5, 6}

Quantifying FM Longitudinal Care Delivery

- Simple question: How many family doctors are providing clinic-based longitudinal care in Alberta?
- Various methods have been used to assess and quantify the delivery of family medicine, each with advantages and challenges
- Specifically, longitudinal relationships are difficult to capture
 - Billing data 7,8
 - Registration information (e.g. CPSA) 9, 10
 - Voluntary physician survey data (e.g. AMA Family Medicine Viability Survey) ¹¹

Objective

To determine key metrics on the delivery of clinic-based longitudinal care in the Edmonton and surrounding area through surveying of Family Medicine clinics.

Methods

- Family Medicine clinics identified through Primary Care Networks (PCNs) and College of Physicians of Alberta (CPSA)
- Survey administered via phone/in-person to Family Medicine clinics providing clinic-based longitudinal outpatient care in the Edmonton area in 2023
- Additional data collected from publicly available resources using CPSA
- Inclusion criteria: Family Medicine Clinics providing longitudinal outpatient care in the Edmonton area
- **Exclusion criteria:** Clinics not providing longitudinal care including those providing only episodic (walk-in) and specialty clinics (e.g., dermatology only)

Results

388 Potential clinics identified through CPSA, PCNs


339 clinics that provide longitudinal care 48 (12.4%) clinics excluded (typical examples: cosmetic clinics, sports medicine clinics, maternity clinics, walk-in clinics)

148 clinics declined to participate (key reason from clinics was time constraints)


191 clinics responded (56% response rate)


662 physicians providing longitudinal care

Results: Physician Medical School Graduation Year




Results: Physician Medical School Location & Graduation Status







Results: Number of Physicians in Clinic



Results: Clinic Age, Physician Supply & Recruitment




Clinic Age




Physician Recruitment

Discussion

- These results provide a snapshot of clinic-based longitudinal care in the Edmonton Area
- Limitations
 - Response rate of 55%
 - Both administrators and physicians eligible to complete survey
 - Changing environment

Conclusions

- The rate of physician loss is higher than the rate of gain
- To ameliorate existing and growing deficits, attention should be paid to policies that increase delivery of longitudinal care.
- Next steps:
 - Expansion of data collection to other areas in Alberta
 - Repeat survey data collection in 2025
