Learning objectives:

1. Recognize early warning signs and symptoms that may indicate serious respiratory conditions, like interstitial lung disease (ILD) or lung cancer
2. Order appropriate diagnostic tests for patients presenting with respiratory symptoms that may indicate ILD or lung cancer
3. Initiate timely referrals for patients who present with warning signs for ILD or lung cancer to avoid diagnostic delays

Description: This presentation is designed to support healthcare providers in identifying and managing both ILD and/or lung cancer. Using a patient case, this course will review the clinical presentation, diagnosis, and treatment of both ILD and lung cancer, with an emphasis on early recognition and intervention.

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12:45–13:45 SOOTHE: Strategies to Optimize Outcomes in Treating Hand Eczema

Room: Hall G - Metro Toronto Convention Centre, South Building

Learning objectives:

1. Recognize and assess chronic hand eczema (CHE), including differentiating CHE from other skin conditions and identifying features of moderate-to-severe disease
2. Apply optimal management strategies for CHE, including appropriate first-line therapy, escalation approaches, and integration of newer non-steroidal topical treatments
3. Personalize CHE treatment plans by considering disease etiology/phenotype, occupational exposures, treatment response, and quality-of-life impact

Description: This program is designed to equip family physicians with practical, evidence-based information to confidently assess and manage chronic hand eczema (CHE), a common, burdensome, and often under-treated condition affecting approximately 15% of individuals over their lifetime, with an even higher prevalence in high-risk occupational groups. Learners will recognize CHE as a distinct clinical entity with heterogeneous presentations and a multifactorial etiology, associated with significant physical, psychosocial, and socioeconomic impact. Interactive patient case studies will highlight real-world application, including “what if” scenarios that explore diverse clinical presentations and management challenges. By the end of the session, attendees will be able to apply a stepwise, patient-centred approach that emphasizes early intervention to prevent chronicity, reduce occupational impairment, and improve long-term outcomes for this challenging condition frequently encountered in primary care.
